In 1944, they settled in Saginaw, Michigan. She joined Tabernacle Baptist Church where she was a very loyal, faithful and active member. in 1965 and spent the next 12 years as a single parent, devoted to rearing her two granddaughters according to Proverbs 22:6, "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." She also admonished her children to do their very best and aim for excellence. Anyone who knew Corean knew that her family meant the world to her. She taught the importance of education, family unity, and strong Christian values. Throughout her life, she shared many pearls of wisdom that will be cherished forever. In July 1977, she married Corinthian McGlothlin whom she cherished and remained devoted until her passing.

A Time to Serve Corean was employed by The Saginaw Club, retiring after 37 years of service. She was an avid golfer and long-time member of the Saginaw Amateur Golf Club, where she served as Treasurer. She was a member of the Old Timers and Senior's Club of the First Ward Community Center. Here she participated in fundraisers and enjoyed the art of ceramics. During her years as a member of Tabernacle Baptist Church, she was a devoted member of the Gospel Chorus, Mass Choir and served as President of the Mission Choir. She enjoyed volunteering, preparing and sharing meals with others. Corean touched the lives of many nieces, nephews, relatives and friends by opening her heart and sometimes her home to provide unconditional love and support when needed.
